FROM THE
PASTOR'S DESK

Advent is here. What do you plan to do other than shop for Christmas and decorate?

Advent is a difficult season for us as Catholic Christians. We don't have traditions of prayer and discipline similar to those that we have in Lent to help us enter into this season. Advent is also a very short liturgical season. And it is hard to enter into the Advent season when the rest of the world has been celebrating Christmas since early October! Yet, Advent is an important season for us as Christians. It is a time in which we should reflect seriously on the marvelous truth that God entered into human history in the person of Jesus. God did this so that we might share in God's life now and one day share in the fullness of God's life forever. God became flesh in Jesus so that each and every one of us might know the salvation that is the desire of God for us. God knows each of us by name and God desires the personal salvation of each one of us. This is truly remarkable! God loves each one of us personally and wants us to share in God's life now and forever! To savor this truth and reflect on its importance for us is a good reason to enter into the Advent season.

What can we do to make Advent a true season of preparation for the great feast of Christmas? Prepare a gift for Jesus each day. The gifts you will offer Jesus on the feast of his birth will be the good deeds you do in this Advent season – visits to the sick and homebound, calls to those who are alone, donations that you make to food banks and soup kitchens, time that you spend with your family without any interruptions for calls, texts, or e-mails. Start each day of Advent with this simple prayer: "Good and gracious God, I ask that these days be a time of grace and blessing for me as I give thanks that you entered into this world in the person of Jesus. May each kind word that I say and each act of kindness that I do be the gifts that I gather to present to your Son on the feast of his birth."

Act and pray every day to make Advent real.

YEAR OF CONSECRATED LIFE – Pope Francis has proclaimed 2015 a Year of Consecrated Life, starting on the First Sunday of Advent, November 30, 2014, and concluding on February 2, 2016, the Feast of the Presentation of Jesus. "Consecrated Life" refers to the men and women who live their lives under public vows of poverty, chastity and obedience in religious congregations such as the Society of Jesus (Jesuits) or the Schoenstatt Sisters. As we give thanks for the witness of these men and women to Christ and his Gospel, all Catholic Christians must recognize that in their work and daily lives they, too, are called to give faithful witness to Christ and his Gospel. We also pray that more young men and women will embrace the consecrated life which offers rich service to God and the people of God.

Prayer for the Year of Consecrated Life:

O God, throughout the ages you have called women and men to pursue lives of perfect charity through the evangelical counsels of poverty, chastity, and obedience. During this Year of Consecrated Life, we give you thanks for these courageous witnesses of Faith and models of inspiration. Continue to enrich your Church by calling forth sons and daughters who, having found the pearl of great price, treasure the Kingdom of Heaven above all things. TREASURES FROM OUR TRADITION - Each of the seven sacraments, like other aspects of the Church's pastoral plan, is an attempt to be faithful to the image of Christ we discover in the Gospels. Anointing of the sick is rooted in Jesus' saving deeds of healing and even rescue from death. What is your favorite encounter of Jesus with a sick person? Often, it seems that Jesus would go at once to the person in a crowd who was in the most pain, in the deepest need. A man born blind, Peter's mother-in-law, a woman afflicted by years of uncontrollable hemorrhages, a little Roman girl beloved by her soldier father, a crippled man lowered from the rafters, and even a man who lost his ear to a swinging sword in the garden of agony. This list reads like an admissions chart in an emergency room, and perhaps that is the point. The whole human experience from childhood to old age, from sudden catastrophic illness to chronic debilitating conditions, is represented by those for whom Jesus has such great compassion. This we can name a treasure of tradition with a capital "T." We are a people of compassion for our sick, who reach out in tenderness to listen, to keep vigil, to strengthen, to touch with reverence, and to anoint with precious oil. *Rev.
