## PALM SUNDAY PASTOR'S MESSAGE

*My face I did not shield from buffs and spitting knowing that I will not be put to shame (Isaiah 50: 7)*

Jesus faces his final destination after three years of walking, preaching and healing in Galilee and Judea. From what we read in the Gospels, most people who had encountered him had formed a strong opinion of Jesus. Many had become his followers, thinking him a prophet, a miracle worker, the Messiah, or the Son of God. Others, however, thought him dangerous, and a rabble-rouser who threatened their hold on power under the Roman government. In the Gospel we hear now, Jesus is greeted with the branches of palm trees, often used to welcome returning heroes. "Hosanna" we cry. "Blessed is He who comes in the name of the Lord". Since this year we read the Passion according St. Mark, it is interesting to see that there is a change of attitudes and feelings although the characters and the city are the same. In the Gospel that was read before the procession, the crowd was supportive, joyous, loving. In the Passion which is the Gospel today, the crowd is quite the opposite. Our palms still lying on the pew behind us, the crowd has become hostile shouting "Crucify him!" to Pilate, painting Jesus as a fraud and a real threat to their interests. As we listen to Mark's account of the Passion, let us imagine the confidence Jesus had in his Father, enabling him to be obedient to the point of death. The Passion of Christ forces us to think of the passion that is still being endured. People of our world: the sick, the prisoners, the immigrants, the deported, the poor and homeless: all are suffering their own crucifixion. On this Palm Sunday that begins Holy Week, let us learn from Isaiah's Suffering Servant. He is resolute, with a confidence that enables him to face anything. Listen to what he has to face: being spat upon, being assaulted, and being beaten. The Servant did not fight back, he did not run, he did not even lift his arms to defend himself. How is he able to do this? He had the words of God and so he relies on God for help. Today we also have the Word of God who comforts us. Let us reflect on this and increase our confidence in the God who faces death so that we can have life. Let us be encouraged by the words of St Paul (second reading) reflecting on the wonderful sacrifice of Christ who was able to redeem the world by his exaltation on the cross. There is quite the contrast between the male and female friends of Jesus in the Mark's account of the Passion. We can see the hearts of the true friends of Jesus so we can take advantage of the true spiritual behavior as disciples of the suffering Jesus. It is curious to note that all the apostles fail Jesus. One betrays him, one denies him, the closest ones fall asleep. They all deserted him when he is arrested and the young Mark run away naked. On the other hand, the account of the Passion begins with a woman anointing Jesus with perfume. It is said that three other women witnessed the crucifixion as close as they could. Moreover, once concluded the celebration of the Sabbath, these same women went to the tomb to anoint Jesus' body. May the sweet Jesus give us loyalty, courage and love of these holy women so we can respect and be in solidarity with the crucified people of our own time.

**PASSION** - The contrast between the processional reading in today's liturgy and the proclamation of the Passion is striking. We are given a glimpse of how profoundly the word of God is fulfilled in Jesus. First he must be hailed as the Messiah, the One who is to come. He must be acknowledged by all, though they do not know what they are saying. They think he is the promised king, a worldly king of the Jews who will free them from the Roman occupation. They do not yet understand, even the disciples, exactly where this triumphal procession is leading. In our lives, we too do not know where we are going. It is in faith that we can follow Christ wherever he may lead us, trusting that death is not the end, nor evil the victor.

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**PALM SUNDAY** - On Sunday, Christians all over the world will be carrying palms and other branches. That's because it's Palm Sunday, a celebration of the day Jesus entered Jerusalem before he was crucified and then resurrected, according to the Christian faith. Christians carry palms on Palm Sunday because according to the Gospels, Jesus' followers covered his path in palm fronds on the day he entered Jerusalem, after the custom of placing palms in the path of a high-ranking person. The palm branch also [signified victory](#) in Greco-Roman times, so the waving palms would have resembled a triumphal procession. In many churches, congregants twist palms into the shape of a cross to commemorate the day, or use other branches if palms are not easily accessible- in some parts of [Europe](#), churchyards are strewn with branches and flowers. The holiday is often celebrated with a procession. Jesus also arrived in Jerusalem on a donkey, which was considered [highly symbolic](#). At the time, a king riding a donkey symbolized peace, while a king on a horse symbolized war - while Jesus was not technically a king, his followers considered him to be King of Israel. Palm Sunday is depicted in all four Gospels, which isn't true of all stories about Jesus. In some congregations, the palms are burned at the end of Palm Sunday and the ashes are saved to use on [Ash Wednesday](#) of the following year. But most of all, Palm Sunday signifies the beginning of the last week of Lent - and the beginning of Holy Week.
